### **GECA – Brief Overview**

- Original developer of Gleneagles wanted a community with significantly more greenspace – TOC agreed on condition that community bore the cost of maintenance
- Liens established on every title in Gleneagles legal obligation to contribute to maintenance of greenspace
- Up until April 1st, 2017 GECA looked after all greenspaces including four parks (Wearmouth, Fenton, Murphy Brothers, View)
- As of April 1st, TOC now owns responsibility for parks...GECA maintains islands and boulevards



1. Call to Order

The President called the meeting to order at 7:04 pm.

#### 4. Presentation and Report Items

#### a) Board Report

The President presented the Board report noting 2015 achievements including a strong financial position with no fee increases and improved fee collection rates. Small loss was noted but overall good financial position. President discussed representation of Gleneagles community with ToC on proposed "Gleneagles Heights" application. Reminded community of website, info@GECA.ca, and online payment options for fee's. President discussed challenges of landscape maintenance to shift to more social gatherings. Ie, BBQ's, creating community events around different holidays etc. due to fee's staying the same despite less maintenance required. President stated the board also wants to work on being more consistent on communicating the rezoning application. President discussed initiatives for the community. Upgrades to certain areas East and West blvd entrances to augment work ToC will be doing.

#### b) Financials

c) The President presented the Statement of Operations for the year ended 31 December 2015 and the Statement of Financial Position as at 31 December 2015. GECA reported a shortfall of revenue over expenses in 2015 of \$1230.00. Revenue and expenses were materially consistent year over year. Net assets increased from \$163,001.00 as at 31 December 2014 to \$163,777.00 as at 31 December 2015. Higher cash and term deposit balances were offset by lower accounts receivable and prepaid expenses balances as well as higher accounts payable and accrued receivables.

#### d) <u>Budget</u>

The President presented the Operating and Project Budgets for 2016. The budget highlights include total income of \$141,424.00, total expense of \$166,128.00, and net income of \$24,704.00. The 2016 budget is different form 2015 due to increased landscaping and maintenance fee's due to ToC contribution decreasing by half, \$22,000.00. Landscape & Maintenance expense is expected to increase 5%. Other capital projects include potential irrigation leaks of \$10,000 and various landscaping projects of \$8,250.

#### e) Landscaping

President discussed as of April 2017 the ToC will assume all responsibility for park maintenance in the 3 main parks; Murphy Brothers, Fenton, and Wearmouth. ToC responsibilities will be 1) lawn care (mowing, trimming, irrigation, fertilization, and weed control) 2) trees and shrubs 3) flower beds 4) snow removal 5) playground inspections/maintenance. GECA will continue to maintain the boulevards and islands throughout the community including GE East and West entrances, GE entrance from Highway 1A, the landing island and boulevard and green space, all of the islands/boulevards in GE East (6) plus one in West.

#### f) Town of Cochrane Reminders

The President presented reminders regarding water conservation measures including rebates for certain products and restricted hours for irrigation.

#### 5. Question and Answer Period

#### a) Landscaping & Irrigation

Much of the discussion in the Q&A portion of the evening was as follows:

-Jerry Murphy from the ToC parks department spoke to residents about the level of care that will occur once the town takes over the parks maintenance.

-Homeowners expressed concern about the infiltration of weeds in certain areas and overall decrease in beautification throughout the community. Jerry Murphy reassured residents that no dormancy of lawns to be done by the town and the level of care to stay the same. Possible solutions are to assess the level of care after one year post transition and if beautification has decreased then residents and board to make official statements back to the town and lobby councillor's etc.

#### b) Speeding

-Homeowners reminded the group that speeding continues to be a problem and we as a community should take pride in slowing down to protect our children. Various options were discussed.

### **GECA Board Report - Wins**

- Replaced outgoing president on short notice and volunteers for existing board remained intact
- Established database of more than 200 e-mails for improved resident communication
- O GECA website and PayPal links operational again
- Successfully transferred accountability for four major parks to Town of Cochrane while maintaining islands and boulevards
- Obtained two additional quotes for landscaping to confirm existing contract is competitive
- Represented interests of Gleneagles residents in meeting with mayor, councilors and administration
- Represented Gleneagles' position on proposed "Jones Estate" redevelopment on two separate applications
- HOA fees remained unchanged (now since 2006)



# **GECA Board Report -Challenges**

- Rebranding GECA from a landscaping association to a true "community" association
- Continually having to respond to repeated redevelopment proposals for Jones Estate
- Lack of volunteers and expertise (I.e. Website, accounting, event planning)
- Five separate strata associations within a single larger organization
- O Desire to "do more" but no desire to "pay more"

### **Zero Waste Framework**

#### Adopted by Council Fall 2012

The Toward Zero Waste report outlines how Cochrane can achieve Zero Waste by focusing on reducing our environmental footprint by minimizing the amount of waste that must be landfilled through waste reduction, reuse, recycling, redesign, composting and other actions.



### **Zero Waste Framework**

Adopted by Council Fall 2012

The overall vision is Zero Waste with the interim goal of 80% of waste diverted from landfill by 2020. The Zero Waste Framework identifies five Pathways to achieving our goals:

- 1. Organics (in all sectors)
- 2. Multi-family recycling
- 3. Industrial commercial institutional recycling
- 4. Construction and demolition recycling
- 5. Events and public spaces



# Residential Organic Waste Strategy

**Direction from Council May 2015** 

- Develop and implement the Residential Organic Waste Diversion Strategy
- Return to Council with the necessary amendments to the Waste Management Bylaw needed to facilitate the strategy implementation





# **Why Organic Matter?**




68% of waste generated by residents in Cochrane is comprised of organics (June 2016)

Organic waste that ends up in landfill decomposes without oxygen and releases methane, a greenhouse gas that is 23x more potent than carbon dioxide emissions in the atmosphere.

# **Why Organic Matter?**

• In 2015, Cochrane residents set out 3,800 tonnes of garbage for disposal at the landfill.

Out of the total sent to landfill:
 68% was organic waste








# **Calgary Waste Diversion Strategy**

# Starting in Fall 2019, Calgary intends to ban food and yard waste from City landfills.





# Impacts on Cochrane20182019

Higher fee for loads of garbage with food and yard waste disposed at City landfills (currently \$113/MT)

\*Details and exact dates for the ban will be announced two years prior to implementation

Loads of garbage containing organics will be turned away or charged up to \$360/MT\* +\$900,000 disposal cost



# Existing programs at the Cochrane Eco Centre

- Drop off yard waste (grass)
- Drop off food waste
- Drop off branches

### Very high cost and low participation ~20% of organic waste captured

# **Community Engagement**

#### Key survey findings (2014):

- 39% use the Eco Centre yard waste drop off
- 7% use the Eco Centre food waste drop off
- 85% would use a residential organics collection program
- 73% would prefer both food and yard waste to be collected together
- 73% were supportive of bi-weekly food and yard waste collection in the winter



# **Community Engagement**

#### Key survey findings (2016):

- 54% put organics in garbage
- 40% take clippings to the Eco Centre
- 8% put clippings in the garbage
- Approximately 49% of the respondents would use a 120L green cart (same size as current black bin) for organic curbside collection (instead of the 240L)

#### Out of this 49%:

- 36% don't grasscycle
- 57% put their organic waste (incl. grass clippings) in the garbage or take it to the Eco Centre
- **12% live in a condo/apartment/townhome**



# **Other Communities**

- Most municipalities in Alberta currently collect organics (food and yard waste) in 240L carts; there are no options for different size carts: Calgary, Strathcona County, Airdrie, Leduc, Spruce Grove, Stony Plain, and more.
- Okotoks is implementing an organics program in Fall 2016 with 120L green carts; the program aims to capture food waste only.
- The only community in Alberta providing an optional 120L green cart beside the classic 240L is the City of St. Albert.
  Currently only 10% of residents opted for 120L (90% are using 240L green cart).



### **Cochrane's Plan**



- 240L green carts for ~ 7800 single family and duplex dwellings
- 120L green carts for ~ 800 townhomes
- Kitchen catcher for all households

The Town will evaluate options for different cart sizes after one year from the implementation of the program.



### **Cochrane's Plan**



- Collection every week in summer
- Collection every two weeks in winter
- Collection schedule:
  - Garbage/recycling: on existing schedule
  - Organics: extra collection day (following garbage/recycling collection day



- Questions about cost
